Workshop Description

This is a bespoke program for students pursing an interest in Videography. Participants will learn in depth on the fundamental of videography and using Manual mode to shoot. Topics that will be covered includes the essential exposure trinity (Shutter Speed, Aperture, ISO), types of shots and the process of doing a videography project.

Essential framing techniques and storyboarding will also be covered in this workshop. Participants will be able to make use of the various setting and techniques learnt in this workshop for their own videography pursuit. The practical segment of the workshop offers the participants an opportunity to hands-on with the guidance of our experienced instructors. They will be provided a camera each for the hands-on session.
