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INTERNATIONAL AWARD-WINNING DIRECTORS TAKE NATIONAL YOUTH FILM AWARDS' (NYFA) YOUTHS UNDER THEIR WINGS

 The new programme, organised by *SCAPE, will see renowned filmmakers mentoring NYFA alumni members to produce short films amidst Covid-19

SINGAPORE, 21 JANUARY 2021 – The National Youth Film Awards (NYFA) is celebrating National Mentoring Month this January with the introduction of its mentorship initiative - the Film Facilitation Fund programme. Organised by *SCAPE, a non-profit organisation, and conceptualised by Huang Junxiang, NYFA 2020's Youth Inspiration Award winner, the programme will see five internationally renowned filmmakers mentoring five past year NYFA winners.

The mentors include Mike Wiluan, co-producer of 2019's hit Hollywood film Crazy Rich Asians and director of action film Buffalo Boys (2018), as well as Daniel Jeannette, the animation director of 2006 film Happy Feet. Each mentor-mentee pair will receive a budget of \$10,000 to produce a short film in a specific genre - action, drama, horror, animation, and comedy - that will be screened exclusively at the annual NYFA Conference come April 2021.

A programme to nurture the next generation of filmmakers

The film industry has been one of the hardest hit by the Covid-19 pandemic. As Singapore's only platform that is catered to youth filmmakers, NYFA remains that pillar of support for aspiring filmmakers to pursue their passion despite trying times.

Working closely with NYFA Youth Inspiration Award winner, Junxiang – producer of films such as Tan Bee Thiam's *Tiong Bahru Social Club* (2020), Mike Wiluan's *Buffalo Boys* (2018), and Eric Khoo's *Ramen Teh* (2018) – the Film Facilitation



Fund programme aims to connect youth filmmakers with industry veterans in a bid to foster their professional development through the sharing of real world experiences.

"The Film Facilitation Fund programme is an excellent initiative to groom the next generation of filmmaking talents, and I am delighted to be a part of it," said Mike Wiluan. "2020 was a difficult year for the film industry, particularly for the young ones. It is encouraging to know that platforms such as NYFA continue to provide the needed guidance and resources, to enable youths to turn their dreams into reality."

A line-up worthy of an Oscar

Joining Mike Wiluan and Daniel Jeanette as mentors are:

- Amanda Nell Eu, director of award-winning short films which have screened in international festivals including Venice, Locarno and Clermont-Ferrand
- Jeremy Chua, Singaporean film producer who has co-produced international feature films by K. Rajagopal, Lav Diaz, Raya Martin and Ying Liang that have premiered in competition at Cannes Critics' Week, Berlinale and Locarno
- Sorayos Prapapan, director of award-winning short films which have screened in international festivals including Venice, Locarno and Clermont-Ferrand

Over the next three-months, mentees will discover new approaches to filmmaking over one-on-one meetings with their mentors. The mentors will guide the filmmakers from scripting to completion, imparting insights from their years of experience in the given genre.

The improvements that we make as artists and filmmakers are not just based on personal abilities, but mostly are the result of hundreds of varied interactions with other members of the film community. Learning by doing, and the influence of senior peers that have been though these paths before, is the best way to expand a film vocabulary and strengthen the tools and skill sets.

Being able to share that knowledge with young filmmakers is a wonderful way to pay it forward, by giving back what has been received over the years. To share that knowledge to empower someone else to do better than you did is the best reward!


Ideally, with time, this will create a more diverse and sustainable filmmaking landscape in Singapore because we need more genre filmmakers.

Mike Wiluan

Bio

Mike Wiluan is the Chief Executive of Infinite Studios (Formerly Infinite Frameworks), a multi award winning media company well known for its production of films, television, visual effects and animation.

With over 17 credits as a producer, some notable shows Mike has produced include Sing to the Dawn (2008) - South East Asia's first English animated feature, My Magic (2008), Be With Me (2005) - both directed by Eric Khoo and were featured at the Cannes Film Festival, 881 (2007) by Royston Tan - one of Singapore's highest grossing films of all time, and award-winning film Crazy Rich Asians (2019) - which was nominated for 2 Golden Globe Awards.

Having moved on to directing, writing, and showrunning, Mike released his directorial debut, a western-action film, Buffalo Boys (2018), which was nominated for Palm Springs International Film Festival. He most recently created a series for HBO Asia titled Grisse (2018).




Amanda Nell Eu

Having worked with top directors like Spike Jonze and Oscar award-winner George Miller, Daniel has been nominated for several awards with the likes of BAFTA, Gold Derby, OFTA and the Saturn Award at the Academy of Science Fiction, Fantasy & Horror Films.

Experienced in Hollywood level visual effects and topnotch movie character animation, Daniel has been in the industry for 35 years with films with the likes of The Hunger Games (2012), Where the Wild Things Are (2009), Happy Feet (2006), The Mummy Returns (2001), The Mummy (1999), The Lost World: Jurassic Park (1997), 101 Dalmatians (1996), Dragon Heart (1996), Jumanji (1995) and Casper (1995).



Sorayos Prapapan

Sorayos Prapapan is an independent filmmaker, sound technician and foley artist based in Bangkok. After completing his studies at the Film and Photography Thammasat University Thailand, he started working as a production assistant for the Palme D'or-winning film Uncle Boonmee Who Can Recall His Past Lives (2010).

He has directed many short films with the likes of Prelude of the Moving Zoo (2020), which made its world premiere at IFFR 2020, Death of a Sound Man (2017), Fat Boy Never Slim (2016), Auntie Ma'am Never Has Never Had a Passport (2014), Boonrerm (2013) and Noumena Scene (2013). His short films have won awards in his home country and were shown at many international film festivals including Rotterdam, Winterthur, Fribourg and Venice.

In 2015, he received the prestigious Hubert Bals Script Development Fund for his feature debut, Arnold is a Model Student.





Jeremy Chua

Bio

Jeremy Chua is a Singaporean film producer and screenwriter based between Singapore and Paris. He started out as a film programming assistant at independent art space the Substation; as well as Cinémathèque at the National Museum of Singapore where he worked on the Edward Yang and Akira Kurosawa retrospectives. From 2011, he worked in the sales and distribution of experimental short films and video art at Lowave Paris.

In 2014, he founded Potocol, a film company focused on development and co-production of independent Asian films. He wrote and co-produced his first film, A Yellow Bird (2016) by K. Rajagopal, which premiered at 55th Cannes Critics' Week. It was a project developed with EAVE Ties That Bind.

He subsequently collaborated with fellow EAVE alumnus Bianca Balbuena to produce *Brotherhood* (2015), which premiered at Karlovy Vary International Film Festival and *A Lullaby to the Sorrowful Mystery*, which premiered at Berlin and Hong Kong International Film Festivals. In 2018, he released his fourth coproduction *A Family Tour* (2018), making its world premiere at Locarno.





Huang Junxiang

Bio

Junxiang enjoys a good comedy and is grateful to be able to pursue a career in filmmaking. His first short film, Give Yourself A Chance, won awards at the 2012 Very Short International Festival, whereas his second, I Will Die, was screened at the 2014 Singapore International Film Festival. Most recently, Piece of Meat, co-directed with Jerrold Chong, enjoyed its premiere at the Directors' Fortnight in Cannes and subsequently travelled to Annecy and Busan.

As a producer with Zhao Wei Films, JX has produced a number of feature films including In The Room (Toronto 2016), Apprentice (Un Certain Regard 2016), Ramen Teh (Berlin Culinary Cinema 2018), Buffalo Boys (Fantasia Film Festival 2018) and Tiong Bahru Social Club (2020) which was screened in Busan and the opening film of the Singapore International Film Festival. He has also served as producer for both HBO Asia anthology series Folklore (2018) and Food Lore (2019).
