THE COMPLETE GUIDE TO NATIONAL YOUTH FILM AWARDS (NYFA) CONFERENCE 2021 - STEPPING STONE TO BECOMING AN AWARD-WINNING FILMMAKER

- The annual NYFA Conference returns as a hybrid event
- *SCAPE NYFA showcases its newest programme, the Film Facilitation Programme

SINGAPORE, 16 APRIL 2021 - The National Youth Film Awards (NYFA) Conference is back again from 16 - 17 April 2021 for film enthusiasts.

Organised by *SCAPE, an organisation that supports the development of Singaporean youths, this year's NYFA Conference is themed 'Pivots and Platforms: Short Films in a New Normal'. With a total of six tracks, the Conference will explore and discuss how filmmaking will evolve in a post-Covid world. Invited speakers will share insights into how filmmaking will transform in the new norm and how youths can be future-ready.

Below is the complete guide to what to look out for, and expect at this year's NYFA Conference.

An exclusive first peak at NYFA Film Facilitation Programme shorts

The Conference will kickstart on 16 April with a closed-door screening of five short films produced under NYFA's Film Facilitation Programme.

Conceptualised by Huang Junxiang, NYFA 2020's Youth Inspiration Award winner, the mentorship journey programme saw five veteran filmmakers mentoring five selected NYFA alumni to produce a short genre film each. The five genres were action, drama, horror, comedy and animation; with each genre mentored by internationally renowned filmmakers such as Mike Wiluan, co-producer of 2019's hit Hollywood film Crazy Rich Asians and director of action film Buffalo Boys (2018), as well as Daniel Jeannette, the animation director of 2006 film Happy Feet.





<u>What to look out for:</u> Apart from the first exclusive look at the five short films, mentors and mentees will share about their experience working together over the last few months. There is also a special panel discussion with Huang Junxiang and the mentees who will share key takeaways from their mentors as well as why such programmes are a necessity for youth filmmakers today.

A hybrid event with tracks for up-and-coming youth filmmakers

This year's NYFA Conference 2021 will be hosted as a hybrid event where attendees can choose to watch from the comfort of their homes, or physically join in at *SCAPE.

The five tracks will each focus on helping youth filmmakers prepare for the post-Covid world. Topics will range from how various film industry professionals and filmmakers can adapt in changing times to workshops on how filmmakers can market their films to catch attention in the age of digitalisation.

One key track is "Film, TV, Web: Is there a Difference Anymore?". This discussion will explore how these platforms are evolving as audience-viewing habits continue to change. Industry veterans and leaders will share how various film industry professionals and filmmakers can adapt to these shifts.

What to look out for: Due to Covid-19 and circuit breaker, NYFA 2020 was conducted fully online without workshops. This year, NYFA Conference will be hosting workshops at *SCAPE again. One exciting (not to be missed) workshop is the "NYFA Conference: Short Film Clinic", where participating youths will have the chance to speak to veteran filmmakers about their ideas and gather feedback.

Also, be on the lookout to see NYFA alumni coming back as invited speakers to share about their journey thus far. They will be passing on their knowledge





on how to market films and create engaging content to help the next generation of filmmakers.

"As a young filmmaker, I have been going to many film events and conferences to expand my knowledge and network with the local film community. It is always interesting to hear their experiences and learn about their filmmaking journey," said GurJeevaan, NYFA alumni and this year's speaker. "Now, I am at the opposite end – sharing my experience as a panellist. It is mind-blowing to see how far I have come. I am grateful for this opportunity and hope to inspire fellow filmmakers on their own journey.

Mike Wiluan

Bio

Mike Wiluan is the Chief Executive of Infinite Studios (Formerly Infinite Frameworks), a multi award winning media company well known for its production of films, television, visual effects and animation.

With over 17 credits as a producer, some notable shows Mike has produced include Sing to the Dawn (2008) - South East Asia's first English animated feature, My Magic (2008), Be With Me (2005) - both directed by Eric Khoo and were featured at the Cannes Film Festival, 881 (2007) by Royston Tan - one of Singapore's highest grossing films of all time, and awardwinning film Crazy Rich Asians (2019) - which was nominated for 2 Golden Globe Awards.

Having moved on to directing, writing, and showrunning, Mike released his directorial debut, a western-action film, Buffalo Boys (2018), which was nominated for Palm Springs International Film Festival. He most recently created a series for HBO Asia titled Grisse (2018).



Amanda Nell Eu

Amanda Nell Eu is a filmmaker based in the UK and Malaysia. Her short film It's Easier to Raise Cattle (2017) premiered in competition in the Venice Film Festival and continued to travel and win awards in many other festivals, including the Special Jury Mention in the International Short Film Festival Clermont Ferrand and was nominated for awards at festivals with the likes of Singapore International Film Festival and Regensburg Short Film Week.

Amanda is an alumni of Berlinale Talents Campus and Locarno Filmmakers Academy. She is developing her first feature film Tiger Stripes, set in Malaysia. In her work, she likes to explore the female body and identity within the context of South East Asia. She is also drawn to Horror, naming the genre her first love for cinema. Some of her other works include Pasak (2012) and Seesaw (2015).





Sorayos Prapapan



Sorayos Prapapan is an independent filmmaker, technician and foley artist based in Bangkok. After completing his studies at the Film and Photography Thammasat University Thailand, he started working as a production assistant for the Palme D'or-winning film Uncle Boonmee Who Can Recall His Past Lives (2010).

He has directed many short films with the likes of Prelude of the Moving Zoo (2020), which made its world premiere at IFFR 2020, Death of a Sound Man (2017), Fat Boy Never Slim (2016), Auntie Ma'am Never Has Never Had a Passport (2014), Boonrerm (2013) and Noumena Scene (2013). His short films have won awards in his home country and were shown at many international film festivals including Rotterdam, Winterthur, Fribourg and Venice.

In 2015, he received the prestigious Hubert Bals Script Development Fund for his feature debut, Arnold is a Model Student.



Jeremy Chua


Jeremy Chua is a Singaporean film producer and screenwriter based between Singapore and Paris. He started out as a film programming assistant at independent art space the Substation; as well as Cinémathèque at the National Museum of Singapore where he worked on the Edward Yang and Akira Kurosawa retrospectives. From 2011, he worked in the sales and distribution of experimental short films and video art at Lowave

In 2014, he founded Potocol, a film company focused on development and co-production of independent Asian films. He wrote and co-produced his first film, A Yellow Bird (2016) by K. Rajagopal, which premiered at 55th Cannes Critics' Week. He subsequently collaborated with fellow EAVE alumnus Bianca Balbuena to produce Brotherhood (2015), which premiered at Karlovy Vary International Film Festival and A Lullaby to the Sorrowful Mystery, which premiered at Berlin and Hong Kong International Film Festivals. In 2018, he released his fourth co-production A Family Tour (2018), making its world premiere at Locarno.

Daniel Jeannette

Daniel Jeannette is an LA based Animation Director and Visual Effects Supervisor, known for his work on the Academy Awardwinning animated film Happy Feet (2006), which won Best Animation Film at the Oscars. He also supervised the Visual Effects and Animation for well-known Spike Jonze film Where the Wild Things Are (2009).

Having worked with top directors like Spike Jonze and Oscar

Having worked with top directors like Spike Jonze and Oscar award-winner George Miller, Daniel has been nominated for several awards with the likes of BAFTA, Gold Derby, OFTA and the Saturn Award at the Academy of Science Fiction, Fantasy & Horror Films.

Experienced in Hollywood level visual effects and top-notch movie character animation, Daniel has been in the industry for 35 years with films with the likes of The Hunger Games (2012), Where the Wild Things Are (2009), Happy Feet (2006), The Mummy Returns (2001), The Mummy (1999), The Lost World: Jurassic Park (1997), 101 Dalmatians (1996), Dragon Heart (1996), Jumanji (1995) and Casper (1995).



Huang Junxiang

Junxiang enjoys a good comedy and is grateful to be able to pursue a career in filmmaking. His first short film, Give Yourself A Chance, won awards at the 2012 Very Short International Festival, whereas his second, I Will Die, was screened at the 2014 Singapore International Film Festival. Most recently, Piece of Meat, co-directed with Jerrold Chong, enjoyed its premiere at the Directors' Fortnight in Cannes and subsequently travelled Annecy and Busan. As a producer with Zhao Wei Films, JX has produced a number of feature films including In The Room (Toronto 2016), Apprentice (Un Certain Regard 2016), Ramen Teh (Berlin Culinary Cinema 2018), Buffalo Boys (Fantasia Film Festival 2018) and Tiong Bahru Social Club (2020) which was screened in Busan and the opening film of the Singapore International Film Festival. He has also served as producer for both HBO Asia anthology series Folklore (2018) and Food Lore (2019).

Grace Song is a Singaporean writer-director. Her recent works under the Creatives Commissioning Creatives residency titled 'Bat Soup' and 'Dirty Laundry' were shot during the lockdown in Singapore, garnering much media attention.

Her short documentary 'Last Time I was an Actress' premiered in competition at the 2020 SeaShorts Film Festival. Selected amongst 5 other filmmakers, her latest work 'When I Talk to You' is a collaboration with the Singapore Lyric Opera for the SGUnited movement. Besides METADATA being her latest endeavour, she has been working on a commissioned short film for the LEAP! Programme called 'Nocturne'.

Ang Qing Sheng is currently a lecturer in the Animation programme at LASALLE College of the Arts Singapore. He holds a Masters of Arts in Arts Pedagogy and Practice from Goldsmith University (London). He has presented at various international conferences, including the Society for Animation Studies Conference in 2016 and 2017, Animation Public Engagement Symposium and the Center for Culture and Cultural Studies Conference in 2015. He has also presented locally at the Learning and Teaching Seminar 2017 in LASALLE. His publications include the peer-reviewed Animation Practice, Process & Production Journal (Intellect) and the Animation Studies Journal (SAS).

As an independent animation filmmaker, he has received support from LASALLE, National Arts Council (Singapore) and IMDA SFC to produce animated short films. "5 Shades of Solitude" was produced for Utter 2015 as part of the Singapore Writer's Festival; "Lak Boh Ki", the world's first Hainanese animated short, has won the Audience Choice Award and Judges Special Prize at the International Digital Animation Festival NAGOYA, Excellent Award at Asiagraph 2016 in Tokyo as well as the Singapore Gold Award at 19th Digicon6 ASIA; "Kua Bo", a Hokkien-animated short film, won the Best Animation at the Singapore National Youth Film Awards 2020 and the Silver Award at the 22nd Diaicon6 ASIA Singapore. He is also a winner of the CDL E-Generation Challenge 2019 which landed him on an Arctic Expedition with worldrenowned explorer Robert Swan. He aspires to produce environmental films to inspire sustainable human-nature coexistence.
